Key Findings

Assets

- Egyptians expect a bright political and economic future.
- They envision a representative government where religious principles guide the democratic process, but with clerics limited to an advisory role.
- No other population in the world rejects attacks on civilians more than Egyptians, whose faith in peaceful means of change has only increased since the revolution.

Challenges

- At the same time, Egyptians are less satisfied with their standard of living, and the availability of necessities.
- They feel their communities have become less safe.
- Most Egyptians continue to have little faith in the leadership of the United States and envision a different kind of partnership for the future.



Most Egyptians Support the Revolution


- 83% supported the protesters who called for former President Mubarak's resignation
- **11%** participated in the protests
- 17% of protesters had home Internet access



Though protesters were more likely to be young, educated, and male, they spanned the demographic spectrum. Their average household income reflected the public at large.


American Public Sympathized With Protesters

- 82% of Americans said they sympathized with Egypt's protesters
- 83% of Egyptians had a similar opinion




Egyptians' Faith in Effectiveness of Peaceful Means Alone to Correct Injustice

Spring 2011*: Can oppressed groups improve their situation through peaceful means alone, or can oppressed groups NOT improve their situation through peaceful means alone?






Egyptians on Local Security and Reported Crime

Within the last 12 months, have you **(read A-B)**?



- B. Just your best guess, on which step do you think you will stand in the future, say about five years from now?






More Egyptians Believe the National Economy Is Getting Better After the Revolution

The Majority of Egyptians Believe Economic Conditions in Their City Are Worsening


Right now, do you think that economic conditions in the city or area where you live, as a whole, are getting better or getting worse?

In the city or area where you live, are you satisfied or dissatisfied with?


The availability of quality health care - % **Satisfied**The availability of good affordable housing - % **Satisfied**

Egypt's Current Political Parties Lack Broad Support



Most Egyptians Favor an Advisory Role for Religious Leaders






Egyptians Approval of U.S. Leadership Unchanged After the Revolution

Do you approve or disapprove of the job performance of the leadership of the U.S.-% Approve




Muslim Brotherhood Supporters Slightly More Likely to Approve of U.S. Leadership

Recommendations



Recommendations for Egypt

- Build on the success of the referendum vote to carry out and build public trust for transparent and fair elections.
- Create jobs and encourage new business development so that more can share in the country's macroeconomic success.
- Improve inter-religious cohesion by focusing on national unity and citizenship equality, rather than pushing for a "secular state."
- Reform local governments and institutions.
- Harness Egypt's positive image with the American public to build a new relationship with the U.S. based on mutual respect and mutual interest.

Recommendations for the United States

- Protect the independence of Egypt's political system by supporting democratic principles, not political parties or individuals.
- Invest in favorable trade agreements and concrete, visible projects that directly address a societal need, rather than "promotion of democracy."

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Survey Methods

- Gallup is entirely responsible for the management, design, and control of this study
- Egypt Results:
 - Bases on face-to-face interviews with approximately 1,000 adults, aged 15 and older, in each survey administration
 - Survey Dates:
 - July 2007
 - April 23-May 18, 2008
 - March 7-22 and Aug. 11-19, 2009
 - March 13-23 and Sept. 25-Oct. 26, 2010
 - March 2-April 2, 2011
 - Margin of Error ranges from ±3.31 to ±3.5 percentage points
- Results From American Public:
 - Bases on telephone interviews with a random sample of national adults aged 18 and older using random-digit-dialing sampling
 - Interviews are conducted with respondents on both landline and cellular phones
 - Landline respondents are chose at random within each household on the basis of which member had the most recent birthday
 - Survey Dates:
 - Feb. 2-5, 2011
 - Margin of Error ranges from ±4 percentage points
- Results From Other countries:
 - Bases on face-to-face interviews with approximately 1,000 adults, aged 15 and older in each country
 - Survey Dates:
 - Various dates in 2009
 - Margin of Error ranges from ±3.3 to ±4.2 percentage points
- The margin of error reflects the influence of data weighting. In addition to sampling error, question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of public opinion polls
