ELECTION 2012 SWING STATES POLLING

Results are based on telephone interviews conducted October 20-27, 2011, on the Gallup Daily tracking survey, with a random sample of 1,334—adults, aged 18+, living in Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Michigan, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Wisconsin, selected using random-digit dial sampling.

For results based on the total sample of “swing state” residents, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 3 percentage points.

For results based on the total sample of 1,169—registered voters in battleground states, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 4 percentage points.

The data represent a subset of Gallup’s national daily tracking survey for October 20-27. Interviews are conducted with respondents on landline telephones and cellular phones, with interviews conducted in Spanish for respondents who are primarily Spanish-speaking. Each daily sample of 1,000 national adults includes a minimum quota of 400 cell phone respondents and 600 landline respondents, with additional minimum quotas among landline respondents by region. Landline numbers are chosen at random among listed telephone numbers, cell phone numbers are selected using random-digit dial methods. Landline respondents are chosen at random within each household on the basis of which member had the most recent birthday.

Samples are weighted by gender, age, race, Hispanic ethnicity, education, region, adults in the household, phone status (cell phone only/landline only/both, having an unlisted landline number, and cell phone mostly). Demographic weighting targets are based on the March 2010 Current Population Survey figures for the age 18+ non-institutionalized population living in telephone households in the 12 swing states. All reported margins of sampling error include the computed design effects for weighting and sample design.

For results based on the total sample of 908—registered voters, one can say with 95% confidence that the margin of error is ± 4 percentage points.
