19TH Amendment and Women's Rights

-- FINAL TOPLINE --

July 13-19, 2020

Results for the survey items are based on self-administered web surveys conducted July 13-19 with a random sample of 3,745 U.S. adults, aged 18 and older, who are members of the Gallup Panel™. Gallup uses probability-based, random sampling methods to recruit its Panel members. For results based on the total sample of national adults, the margin of sampling error is ± 3 percentage points at the 95% confidence level.

For results based on sample of $-1,923-$ women, the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 5 percentage points.

For results based on sample of $-1,727-$ men, the maximum margin of sampling error is ± 4 percentage points.

Gallup weighted the obtained samples to correct for nonresponse. Nonresponse adjustments were made by adjusting the sample to match the national demographics of gender, age, race, Hispanic ethnicity, education, and region. Demographic weighting targets were based on the most recent Current Population Survey figures for the ages-18-and-older U.S. population. Margins of error for subgroups are higher. Sample counts are included for each question to account for daily changes to the questionnaire — question-specific field dates are available upon request.

In addition to sampling error, question wording and practical difficulties in conducting surveys can introduce error or bias into the findings of public opinion polls.
